Dear Parent/carer,

I write at the end of what has been a very difficult and unusual Autumn Term for the whole school community. Fortunately, due to careful planning and management of COVID safety, the impact of the pandemic has been relatively light within school. Incidents of positive cases have been rare, well-contained, and the systems we have in place has meant we have had a limited number of pupils required to self-isolate. This has meant that although attendance has declined it currently remains above national average.

During the term, we have welcomed regulatory monitoring visits from the Health and Safety Executive (HSE) and Ofsted, both were very positive. In addition to this, we commissioned an external Safeguarding audit to validate existing good practice and identify areas for further development.

Staff have worked hard to adjust the curriculum to assess and address any knowledge gaps caused by the school closure, ensuring steps are in place to recover lost learning. Support is also in place to remedy pastoral issues triggered or exacerbated through the pandemic. During the Ofsted visit, inspectors explored the impact of COVID on the school community and the measures in place to deal with a safe return to school. A report will be available in the New Year summarising their findings, the visit does not replace an inspection and does not result in a grading or categorisation.

I have been extremely impressed with the resilience of our returning pupils and the manner in which they have responded to working in year group hubs and zones. I believe this has been a contributory factor in keeping the school open to pupils. However, it is important all pupils take responsibility for maintaining the rigour, high standards and expectations in place by adhering to social distancing guidance, wearing masks and regularly sanitising. I would appreciate parents support in ensuring your child attends school with a mask every day and reinforcing this message.

At present, Year 11 examinations are set to go ahead in the Summer with some adjustments to dates, content and opportunities to resit if unable to attend. Mock examinations have taken place at the end of term and pupils have responded to them with a positive and mature attitude, this reflects the encouraging behaviour we have seen from this cohort since their return in June. Booster sessions are well attended and will continue throughout the year.



Despite the school closure, building works and refurbishment projects have continued as planned; rewiring of the English and Maths classrooms, roofing replacement, external canopies, refurbished toilets and classrooms.

As we are entering that time of year, where the weather can be unpredictable, we have procedures in place should we need to make a decision to close the school. As we now have established platforms for remote learning, lessons will be provided remotely via Google Classrooms should we be forced to close the building, this will ensure there is no further lost learning time.

You may be aware that term dates relating to Christmas holidays has been a topic of debate nationally. Governors have agreed an early school closure for Friday the 18th December with remote learning provided on Monday 21st and Tuesday 22nd December following the red week timetable. The school will reopen on Monday 11th January as originally planned and this will be a blue week. This decision was been made to ensure a period of time to avoid contact so that families are COVID safe to meet over the festive period.

The COVID reporting email covid@reddish.stockport.sch.uk will continue to be active and monitored by senior leaders during the holidays for you to notify us of any positive cases. Track and trace practices will continue to be carried out as appropriate.

May I take this opportunity to wish you all a very Happy Christmas and a Healthy and Prosperous New Year.

stepped up and bought the produce, raising an amazing £81.20 which we have now donated to the Royal British Legion.






Stockport Normandy Veterans Competition Success!

All students at Reddish Vale have access to the Language Nut app and they can get their log in details from their languages teacher or via Google Classroom.




Black History Month
